Out and About

On Tuesday morning the **2KA** Out and About team visited the Dragon Tree in Brighstone. The children discussed what animals need to survive and designed their own creature using clay, talking about what it needed and the habitat it would live in.

"We went to the Dragon Tree. We made clay creatures. We were thinking about what they need to live; they needed water, shelter, air and food. I enjoyed finding things to make my creature, like loads of sticks! I based it on a kind of spidery thing with lots of legs. I did enjoy going on the rope swing too!" Charlie 2KA



Next term the children in **Year 3** will be learning about the Stone Age in History, in readiness, the **3PT** Out and About group walked up to the Longstone at Mottistone on Tuesday afternoon. The children learnt about the 6,000 year old, Neolithic long barrow (burial mound) and talked about the lives of Stone Age people.

"We went to the Longstone. In the Stone Age people used to bury bodies there, in the Neolithic time. In the Stone Age, people used to eat animals and use their fur for clothes. They made weapons from stones. I enjoyed the walk and having our photo taken on the big stones!"

The children in **Year 4** have been learning about farming and land use in Geography as well as animals in Science. The **4MC** Out and About children visited Nettlecombe Farm in Whitwell on Wednesday morning. The farm has a passion for rare breeds animals and has diversified to run holiday cottages, a fishing lake and also runs yoga classes. The children all loved hand feeding the animals and learnt lots about the differences between each animal (their teeth or beaks, stomachs, hooves etc), how the farm is run and what the job of a farmer entails! Many children said they would love to pursue a career with animals when they're older.

"We went to Nettlecombe Farm. I enjoyed feeding the chickens, the sheep, the goats and the donkeys. Oreo the sheep was cuddling up to me and he fell asleep on my shoulder. He was so cuddly and woolly. I learnt that deer's antlers fall off every year and grow back. Sheep only have bottom teeth so they don't bite you they just lick the food off your hands. Sheep have 4 stomachs just like cows." Jesse 4MC



Our **Year 1** children have been learning about senses in Science. The **1CE** Out and About group visited Borthwood Copse to explore their senses in the forest as well as looking for signs of Autumn. The children talked about what they could hear, see, smell and touch. They were challenged to create a face using things they could find and described the texture of the items they had chosen.

"We went to the forest to play and read stories. We were thinking about our senses and Autumn. In the Autumn the leaves turn orange and fall off the trees. We had to find Autumn leaves, acorns and sticks to make faces. I enjoyed climbing on the logs!" Declan 1CE

Social Media Issues



Most major social media platforms – FaceBook, TikTok, Instagram, Snapchat, Twitter, Pinterest, WhatsApp to mention just a few, require users to be at least 13 years of age (and in some cases 16 - WhatsApp).

Pre-teens are not ready to handle the world of social networking and all its implications. Some social media platforms do not use any age verifications tools, leaving your child able to sign up for a new account without your knowledge. They will then have access to explicit and inappropriate content without restriction. TikTok has a feature called 'Family Pairing' allowing parents to link their child's account to their own, set time limits and control direct messages. Parents receive notification if any setting are changed or turned off.

Some social media platforms also share data with third-party service providers – even when the apps are not being used. That means if your child copies and pastes sensitive information or private conversations it is available to those third-party providers.

It is becoming ever more apparent that a number of Queensgate pupils are using various social media platforms to contact other pupils in an unfriendly and bullying manner. In turn parents are contacting school to involve us, make us aware of what is going on and asking us to resolve these out of school disagreements. Whilst we take all instances of bullying within school seriously and look for resolutions, the amount of time that is being taken up trying to resolve out-of-school issues is impacting greatly on the amount of time dedicated to education within school.

The decision to allow your child to use social media platforms means you, as the parent/responsible person, should monitor your child's online activity to ensure they are using platforms responsibly.

This week has been a busy week with a range of sports related events.

Key stage assemblies

We started the week with our sports leaders presenting an assembly on why it is important to be active. They told the school about the physical and mental health benefits as well as how being active can help with academic attainment. They then informed the rest of the school what they were going to be organising to help them get active.



Sport leaders

Tag Rugby Skills Festival



Yesterday some children from Year 4 and Year 6 took part in a tag rugby skills festival held at Queensgate. Each school went around to the six stations in their groups and took part in the training activity that was run by some students from The IOW College. The children all worked really hard at each of the stations, gaining vital skills and having great fun in the process. At the end of the festival, the children were presented with medals, which they were incredibly proud of.

Sports for Champions

On Thursday Jordan Catchpole, Paralympian swimmer, led an assembly to the whole school and then ran a circuit-based workshop for all classes. Jordan spoke about how he has won a lot of races but also lost races and that it was ok to lose a race, sometimes you have bad days and sometimes you have good days. As long as you keep working hard, there will be more good than bad days.

Jordan has already qualified to compete at the Paris Olympics in a number of events. Hopefully we may even be able to watch his races in school as the Paralympics will be on when we return to school after the summer holidays.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

With more than two billion active users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls, WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service. Its end-to-end encryption only allows messages to be viewed by the sender and any recipients: not even WhatsApp itself can read them. This privacy issue has been in the spotlight recently, as the UK's Online Safety Bill proposes to end such encryption on private messaging; WhatsApp is unwilling to do so and has reportedly considered withdrawing its service in the UK should this legislation go ahead.

EVOLVING SCAMS

WhatsApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammers. Recent examples include posing as the target's child, requesting a money transfer because of a spurious 'emergency'. Plus a scam where fraudsters trigger a verification message by attempting to log in to your account, then (posing as WhatsApp) call or text to ask you to repeat the code back to them, giving them access.

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

To start a chat, someone only needs the mobile number of the WhatsApp user that they want to message. If your child has ever given their number out to someone they don't know, that person could then contact them via WhatsApp. It's also possible that your child might be added to a group chat (by one of their friends, for example) containing other people that they don't know.

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows news to be shared rapidly - whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more than five times on the app now display a "Forwarded many times" label and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they've just received is far from an original... and might not be entirely factual, either.

'VIEW ONCE' CONTENT

The facility to send images or messages that can only be viewed once has led to some WhatsApp users sharing inappropriate images or abusive texts, knowing that the recipient can't re-open them later to use as evidence of misconduct. People used to be able to screenshot this 'disappearing' content - but a recently added WhatsApp feature now blocks this, citing increased privacy.

CHAT LOCK

Another new option allows users to store certain messages or chats in a separate 'locked chats' folder, saved behind a passcode, fingerprint or face ID authentication. The risk here is that this function creates the potential for young people to hide conversations and content that they suspect their parents wouldn't approve of (such as age-inappropriate material).

VISIBLE LOCATION

WhatsApp's 'live location' feature lets users share their current whereabouts, which can be helpful for friends meeting up or parents checking that their child's safely on the way home, for example. However, anyone in your child's contacts list or in a mutual group chat can also track their location - potentially letting strangers identify a child's home address or journeys that they make regularly.

Advice for Parents & Carers ...TYPING...

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage your child to treat unexpected messages with caution: get them to consider, for example, whether the message sounds like something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step verification adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account.

THINKING BEFORE SHARING

Help your child to understand why it's important to stop and think before posting or forwarding something on WhatsApp. It's easy - and all too common - for content to then be shared more widely (even publicly on social media). Encourage your child to consider how an ill-judged message might damage their reputation or upset a friend who sent something to them in confidence.

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

It's wise to change your child's WhatsApp settings (go to 'Privacy', then 'Groups') to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chats without needing approval; you can give permission to 'My Contacts' or 'My Contacts Except...'. Additionally, if your child needs to use 'live location', emphasise that they should enable this function for only as long as they need - and then turn it off.

CHAT ABOUT PRIVACY

Some parents like to check in with their child about how they're using WhatsApp, explaining that it will help to keep them safe. If you spot a 'locked chats' folder, you might want to talk about the sort of chats that are in there, who they're with and why your child wants to keep them hidden. Also, if your child has sent any 'view once' content, you could discuss their reasons for using this feature.


