There is lots of news to inform you of so if you are a regular reader of the newsletter - thank you, and please ask other parents to have a read as it really helps that everyone gets the same message.


During our INSET training days I talked to the staff about the main school drivers for the year - there are two broad headings, which are:

- to increase outcomes in all National external measures A Good Level of Development (GLD) in Reception, Year 1 Phonics Screen, Year 2 Phonics retake, Multiplication Tables Check in Year 4 and of course SATs in Year 6. We had great results across the board last year and this year but we want to stay above National averages and increase children working at Greater Depth.

Working Together for a Successful Future

I have spoken to the children yesterday in assembly about our new behaviour visions. These are under the headings of:

Collaboration, Compassion, Courage, Creativity and Curiosity.



Lots of behaviours that are on the school code will fall under these main headings. Dojo will be changed to have these categories too so everyone will be earning points towards them. I am hoping that children remember these five areas and did well after the assembly. Please do ask them about these words, what they mean and to give any examples.

The children will receive more positive praise, more good news cards and more Dojo points when they match a vision word. They will no longer receive a Queensgate 'goody' as these were losing value with the children and cost quite a lot of money. When they reach 100 Dojo's (hopefully at the end of the Autumn term) they will receive a bronze badge to wear on their school uniform, at 200 Dojos – a silver badge and at 300 Dojos a gold badge plus a book. The children seemed quite excited and motivated in assembly about this.

To help with this we have relocated the Nest (which is to revert back to it's old name of The Den) to one of the mobile classrooms. Mrs Bradbury, Mrs Hill and Miss Lovett will be in the Den in the mornings and will sweep up those children that have entered the wrong zone, take them to the Den with work, get them back to the green zone, help with their work and then transition back to the class at the next appropriate point. This means that they don't miss out on learning, and the other children in the class don't get disturbed. It is very much a work in progress but the first few days have shown the possibilities of it.

ELSA support will be offered by Miss Lovett in the afternoons. I have a good feeling about this year.

Timings of the Day

I know you have received lots of messages in Compass about the new timings in the morning. Even though we extended the day by 10 minutes in the afternoon we still weren't quite hitting the statutory amount. By ensuring that the register is taken earlier this now makes us compliant.

As a reminder - gates open at 8.30am, doors open at 8.40am and doors/gates close at 8.50am. I appreciate that this doesn't help the situation when it is busy on the roads but getting them through the door at 8.40am is the goal.

As some of you have noticed, Year 5 and 6 now congregate on the Key Stage 2 playground in the morning - this gives them more space to wait in, plus frees up the walkway to the back of the school from that side. So far it has worked well. You may have noticed a red and white chain across the top of the steps leading to the car park. This has been put there as a measure to stop children and parents from using these steps and walking through the car park. Our support staff leave at 3pm so there are always cars coming and going at this time, all children and their adults should walk past the main entrance and down the main path to Beatrice Avenue, please DO NOT walk across the car park. Thank you.

Uniform


Thank you for supporting our uniform policy, the children all looked so smart this week. Please do name jumpers and coats as we always have lots left after a break especially when the weather is nice and we are on the field. Although uniform is important I am always willing to acknowledge that it is expensive and, from time to time, shoes may be different as you await an opportunity to purchase new ones. If this is the case please try and send them in with non colourful trainers as they really do stick out!

As I made it known before we broke up, Out & About children should now wear their PE kits rather than 'normal clothes'. We have made this decision for many reasons including, safeguarding (easier to spot a child in uniform), some clothes were totally inappropriate for Out & About sessions and means that children do not stand out in the classes when waiting to go or returning from their experience. Thank you for your support in this matter.

In regards to the PE kit itself, it has been brought to my attention that navy shorts for girls are very difficult to come by (unless quite baggy football style ones), I am therefore saying that navy or black shorts can be worn and the same for jogging bottoms (preferably non branded). I am happy for girls to wear cycling style shorts but the leg length must be close to the knee and not these popular very short style ones.

Staffing

The Governors are busy recruiting a new Head Teacher. The closing date is next Tuesday (9th September) and interviews will be carried out on 16th and/or 17th September. If successful then we expect the new head to be in post by January. I will keep you informed about this as I know more. I am committed to continuing as Acting Head until a suitable candidate is found. Once again I thank you all for your support. Mrs Saddington is unfortunately poorly and has been signed off for next week, so we will be welcoming a familiar face back to Queensgate - Miss Mawudoku! She will work with Mrs Norsworthy in 5TS.



"We are no longer supplying Tapnell Farm with our shredding for use as bedding for their animals; this is due to the difficulties in getting it to them. So, we would like to offer out large bags of shredding to families for £1 a bag. The shredding can be used for your small animals e.g. hamsters, guinea pigs, rabbits and is cheaper than buying straw. 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Working Together for a Successful Future







Dear parent/carer.

Your child's school has chosen to be part of an exciting initiative to encourage more children and their families to walk to school. **WOW** – **the walk to school challenge** is delivered by Living Streets, the UK charity for everyday walking, to help as many children as possible experience the benefits of walking to school.

The pupil-led challenge enables children to self-report how they get to school every day. If they travel actively (walk/wheel, cycle, scoot or Park and Stride) at least once a week for a month, they get rewarded with a badge. It's that simple!

What are the benefits of walking to school?

- Children feel happier and healthier
- They arrive to school refreshed and ready to learn.
- Helps reduce congestion and pollution at the school gates.

What if we can't walk to school?

If driving, 'Park and Stride' to help your child earn their WOW badges. Park at least ten minutes away from the school and walk the remaining journey.

If using public transport, hop off **at least ten minutes away** and walk the rest (recorded as 'other' on the WOW Travel Tracker).

Where walking to school isn't an option, we work with schools to establish a bespoke approach to WOW that works best for their pupils' needs.

What is a WOW badge?

There are 11 badges to be earned from September 2025 – July 2026. Each badge has been designed by a pupil as part of our annual WOW Badge Design Competition. A new badge can be earned every month if pupils walk/wheel, cycle, scoot, 'Park and Stride' or hop off at least once a week.

WOW 2025/26 encourages pupils to *Walk with Joy*, with badges depicting everything from jumping in puddles to painting

The badges are made in Cornwall from material that was otherwise destined for landfill, including fridge trays, plastic plates and yoghurt pot off-cuts. For more information, visit:
